

Voting Suppression Maneuvers in North Carolina

The battleground states -- those with relatively even numbers of Republican and Democratic voters --- are often key to both winning the electoral college and the presidency, as well as controlling the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives. We begin this month a series of articles highlighting concerns about voting laws and practices in these states. We focus first on North Carolina, where a change to a Republican majority in the State Supreme Court after the 2022 elections, plus the recent transition to a veto-proof Republican legislative supermajority, could foreshadow the passage of more laws restricting voting rights.

On May 2, members of the HR Class of '73 gathered at St. Botolph's Club in Boston to meet and hear from **Laila Khondkar**, this year's Benazir Bhutto Fellow for ClassACT HR73. In memory of our late classmate Benazir Bhutto, who served twice as Prime Minister of Pakistan, ClassACT has funded five mid-career students in the Mason Fellows Program at HKS. The BBLP initiative primarily supports women leaders in the Muslim world: a native of Bangladesh, Laila specializes in child rights and advocacy; she has worked with international development and public health organizations in multiple settings and launched her own child awareness website, Shishurai Shob, in 2020. In a lively hour-long exchange, Laila spoke with ClassACT Board member **Leigh Hafrey** and other classmates about her mission and her time at HKS, as well as her hopes for an ongoing collaboration with the BBLP Fellows' network and ClassACT HR73.

1. Reinventing American Democracy for the 21st Century Where: 50th Reunion--Science Center, Harvard University When: Thursday, June 1, 9-10:15am Presentation by: <u>Danielle Allen</u>

The 75-minute symposium will feature a presentation by Harvard professor **Danielle Allen**, James Bryant Conant University Professor at Harvard University, Director of Harvard's Edmond & Lily Safra Center for Ethics, and Co-Chair of the American Academy of Arts & Sciences initiative, Our Common Purpose: Reinventing American Democracy for the 21st Century, which proposes specific recommendations and reforms to insure our democracy.

The presentation will be followed by a discussion by the panel and Prof. Allen, led by E. J. Dionne.

2. From the Charles River to Half-Earth: 50 Years to 50 Percent

As undergrads we associated the Charles River and Boston Harbor with tetanus and sewage. **Jesse Ausubel** will report on surprisingly diverse and abundant aquatic life discovered in a slurp of water with modern genomics near the Boat House and USS Constitution and look back nostalgically on the fear of falling off a shell, raft or dinghy.

John Kress will then lead a conversation among classmates engaged in the ClassACT HR73 Environment and Climate Change Working group. The late Harvard biologist Edward O. Wilson, in his 2016 book Half-Earth: Our Planet's Fight for Life, proposed the designation of half of Earth's surface, both terrestrial and marine, as a natural reserve to safeguard the remaining biodiversity of the planet. With participants' backgrounds in environment, law, government, medicine, business, and academics, discussion will focus on

action that can be taken through ratification of international biodiversity treaties and local to global land trusts as vehicles for species and ecosystem protection.

On Tuesday, April 25, classmates met in Washington, DC, for two prereunion events.



Osiligi Medical Center Update in Kenya

Maasai patients continue to receive medical care in the Osiligi Medical Dispensary from the medical staff assigned by the Narok Health Department in Kenya. Construction on the second Osiligi Medical Center housing a pharmacy, medicinal lab for traditional medicine, a dentist's office and vision care office has been completed by a local contractor and the facility awaits the installation of a dentist's chair along with dentistry, pharmaceutical and vision equipment. **David Weeks '73** will be traveling to Kenya in July and looks forward to securing an updated MOU with the Narok Health Department to attract the medical staff to sustain this new facility. In the original arrangement between the Osiligi Medical Complex and the Narok Health Department, staff housing has been included in a two-story residential building that will double as a small hospital ward with a few rooms for

patients needing extended medical treatment. Architectural plans have been created for the hospital residential building and have been presented to a contractor for a construction estimate. In addition to funding for the equipment in the Osiligi Medical Center, David Weeks hopes to attract financial support for the construction of the Osiligi Hospital Ward with its residential accommodations for medical staff. In addition to funding, present needs from classmates include consultation for dentist and pharmaceutical equipment as well as guidance in public health, especially in relationship to family planning. Consultation on essential medical equipment needs in a small hospital facility and solar panel energy would also be greatly appreciated. Salih Self-Development Center Update in Ghana

The Salih sewing vocational training center in Kumasi, Ghana continues to empower girls and young women with valuable skills. In addition to this vocational training that has improved the quality of life for its recipients, there has been a need to educate youth to embrace construction skills in

carpentry, plumbing and electrical work. To prepare for establishing vocational training in these skills, the Salih Self-Development Center has purchased two acres of land in Kumasi, installed a well, constructed a modest caretaker cottage and hired a local person to protect its investment. Plans have been created for the construction of a vocational training facility. President Ibrahim Salih of the Salih Self-Development Center will travel to Ghana this summer and discuss vocational training for youth with Kumasi government officials as well as partner with educators presently involved with vocational training in construction skills. From his research, there is a dearth of skilled vocational training teachers in Kumasi and a need for teacher training and financial support for their education. David Weeks seeks support from classmates familiar with vocational training in the construction skills associated with carpentry, plumbing and electrical work. He also hopes to collaborate with a classmate who has experience in vocational training curriculum development. Consultation on solar panel energy for the planned Salih Vocational Center as well as financial support for its construction are also desired.
