More than a year after the Russians launched a massive brutal assault against the sovereign nation of Ukraine, ClassACT HR73 once again invites you to a wide-ranging discussion about this war. Moderator **Bill Kristol '73**, a widely respected analyst of global affairs and founding director of Defending Democracy Together, will lead a discussion with Nobel Prize winning economist **Roger Myerson '73**; former U.S. Ambassador to Croatia **Peter Galbraith '73**; and international security expert and retired Marine Colonel **Mark Cancian '73**. Drawing on their knowledge of Ukraine's past tragedies, these panelists will analyze the current state of the war from military, political

and economic perspectives. Questions they are likely to consider include: How can the Ukraine's counter-offensive succeed? Will the support of Ukraine and unity among its European allies remain strong? How does the current turmoil in the U.S. House of Representatives threaten funding and support for Ukraine? What are the best ways to continue humanitarian relief for the civilians under attack in Ukraine?

Advancing Science: Debbie Winn '73



Virginia 2023 Elections Will Be a "Bellwether"

As anxieties grow for the 2024 Presidential elections, Virginia voters are

preparing for a state legislature election next month observers have deemed a "bellwether." The outcome not only will determine who controls Virginia's House of Delegates and Senate, but also the fate of the state's policies on abortion, gun control and climate change. In addition, winning Republican majorities in both chambers could jump-start the presidential campaign of Governor Glen Youngkin as a possible GOP alternative to Donald Trump.

This November all 140 seats in Virginia's legislature will be up for grabs. The Republicans have a four-seat majority in the House of Delegates as well as the governorship. Democrats, who won the Senate in 2019, hold a two-seat majority that has allowed them to stop Republican efforts to weaken abortion rights and impose restrictions on some voters. This past August the Democrats' majority in the Senate also enabled them to halt Youngkin's proposal that would reduce taxes on corporations and high income individuals.

If the Democrats lose the Virginia Senate this fall, Republicans will have a "trifecta" that will allow them to limit or even ban abortion rights and to overturn the gun control measures like background checks that Democrats established in 2020. In contrast, winning both the upper chamber and the House of Delegates would give Democrats new leverage in budget negotiations with the state's Republican governor.

If Republicans retake the Senate and hold onto the House of Delegates, Youngkin and GOP legislators would have the ability to enact previously unsuccessful legislation to oppose Medicaid expansion, to allow religious organizations to deny services to LGBTQ citizens, and to eliminate strict emissions controls. Republicans need to win only one additional seat to tie the Senate, an outcome that would permit the Republican lieutenant governor to cast a tie breaker vote.

WHAT TO KNOW/HOW YOU CAN HELP

The massive and small contributions to both parties will fund the canvassing and ad buys designed to drive the voter turnout key to victory in this election. Early voting began on September 22 and will run through 5:00 PM on November 4. Like his Democratic rivals, Youngkin is urging GOP voters to cast their ballots in advance at an early voting location.

Registered voters in Virginia can also <u>request a mail-in ballot</u> before 5:00 pm on October 27. They can check their registration, locate their polling place and request an absentee ballot.

All voters need a valid driver's license or other ID in order to vote in this critical election.

It is not too late to help register voters and facilitate voting for all citizens, regardless of political affiliation. Residents of Virginia as well as other states and the District of Columbia can volunteer for or contribute to one of the following non-partisan organizations:

- The <u>League of Women Voters</u> protects and expands voting rights through advocacy and education.
- <u>Virginia Legislative Elections Guide</u> provides a nonpartisan guide to key votes.
- <u>Virginia Civic Engagement Table</u> supports non-profit organizations that assist at polling sites and provide voter protection hotlines.
- WorkElections recruits poll workers.
- VoteRiders offers Voter ID assistance.
- <u>BigTentUSA</u> gets out the vote through phone banking, post card writing, registration drives.
- <u>BlackVotersMatter</u> increases the voter engagement of Black citizens. Black Voters Matter is this year's Justice Aid 2023 Grantee Partner.
- <u>Rideshare2Vote</u> increases voter turnout through providing transportation.

The Justice & Civic Engagement Committee is actively involved in three major initiatives dedicated to protecting our democracy: The State Voting Protection Project, JusticeAid's voting rights and empowerment initiative with Black Voters Matter, and a new project in development on Civic Education.

1. The State Voting Protection Project



This project (scroll down to see it on our <u>Justice & Civic Engagement Page</u>) features a series of monthly articles leading up to the 2024 elections that focus on issues and challenges relating to voter suppression, policies and access to the polls in the following states: Arizona, Florida, Georgia, Michigan, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Texas, Virginia and Wisconsin. The goal is for these articles and the issues they raise to have wide distribution among classmates, the ClassACT multi-class effort, and other non-profit groups. 2. In Development: Civics Education Project



There is a concerning lack of Civics Education in this country, leaving many high school graduates without basic knowledge of the principles that are at the core of our democracy or how our government works at the federal, state, and local levels. As a result, far too many young people are not being prepared to participate in an informed and meaningful way in our democracy.

HR'73 classmate **Andy Marks** is reaching out to classmates with a goal of setting up a 6-9 person think tank representing diverse backgrounds, viewpoints and expertise to debate and propose a potential ClassACT Civic Education initiative. Update on ClassACT's Healthcare Working Group



Debbie Winn '73 and **Stan Mark '73** met in August with about 8 other classmates, most of whom came on board as a result of indicating interest during the reunion, to determine next steps for the ClassACT HR73 health focused group. Other group members, including board member **Ron Dieckmann '73**, welcomed the new participants. At the meeting, the group determined that the areas of interest were:

- Global Health
- Pandemic Issues and Vaccines
- Reproductive Issues
- Healthcare Inequities
- Mental Health

• Aging and Chronic Diseases

It was decided to create subgroups for each area of interest. Debbie and Stan are currently soliciting chairs for these groups--a task they hope to have accomplished by the end of October.

Progress on the Multi-Class Movement

Recognizing the need to build sustainability and legacy, ClassACT HR'73 continues to meet with several other Harvard classes to explore opportunities for building ClassACT initiatives in individual classes, as well as a multi-class collaborative. Some of these classes have developed their own ClassACT structures or similar approaches and a multi-class leadership group is evolving. In September, leaders from six classes met with Kristin DeAmicis, Senior Director of College Alumni Programs for a conversation about how HAA and ClassACT can best support each other, including options for introducing ClassACT to major reunion classes. HAA continues to be strongly supportive of ClassACT development and it is anticipated that the ClassACT model will be discussed with reunion committee chairs and committees over the next several months. Discussions with Travis Lovett, Harvard's Assistant Dean, Civic Engagement and Service, are expected later this fall.

Our new staff member is focused on growing CRC's Workforce Development Program which supports job seekers living with mental health conditions. 
